THREE/FOUR COMBO CLASSROOM OBJECTIVES

Social-Emotional Development

- Comforts self by seeking out an object or special person.
- Is able to look at a situation differently or delay gratification.
- Accepts redirection from adults.
- Manages classroom rules, routines, and transitions with occasional reminders.
- Demonstrates confidence in meeting own needs.
- Manages separation without distress and engages with trusted adults.
- Demonstrates concern about the feeling of others.
- Uses successful strategies for entering groups.
- Plays with one or two preferred playmates.
- Takes turns.
- Seeks adult help to resolve social problems.
- Suggests solutions to social problems.

Physical Development

- Moves purposefully form place to place with control.
- Sustains balance during simple movement experiences.
- Coordinates complex movements in play and games.
- Manipulates balls or similar objects with flexible body movements.
- Uses refined wrist and finger movements.
- Holds drawing and writing tools by using a three-point finger grip.

Language Development

- Responds appropriately to specific vocabulary and simple statements, questions, and stories.
- Follows directions of two or more steps that relate to familiar objects and experiences.
- Describes and tells the use of many familiar items.
- Is understood by most people.
- Tells simple stories about objects, events, and people.
- Engages in conversations of at least three exchanges.
- Uses complete four- to six-word sentences.
- Uses acceptable language and social rules while communicating with others.
- Uses appropriate eye contact.

Cognitive Development

- Sustains interest in working on a task.
- Practices an activity many times until successful.
- Observes and imitates how other people solve problems.
- Explores and investigates ways to make something happen.
- Shows eagerness to learn about a variety of topics and ideas.
- Uses creativity and imagination during play and routine tasks.
- Recalls familiar people, places, objects and actions from the past.
- Remembers the sequence of personal routines and experiences.
- Places objects in two or more groups based on differences in a single characteristic.
- Draw or constructs, and then identifies what it is.

- Acts out familiar or imaginary scenarios.
- Interact with two or more children during pretend play, assigning and/or assuming roles and discussing actions.

Literacy Development

- Fills in the missing rhyming word, generates rhyming words spontaneously.
- Decides whether two words rhyme
- Hears and shows awareness of separate words in sentences.
- Recognizes as many as 10 letters, especially those in own name.
- Identifies the sounds of a few letters.
- Shows awareness that some words begin the same way.
- Knows some features of a book (title, author, illustrator).
- Shows an understanding that text is meaningful and can be read.
- Asks and answers questions about the text, refers to pictures.
- Retells some events from a familiar story with adult prompting.
- Retells familiar stories, using pictures or props as prompts.
- Pretends to read, using some of the language from the text. Describes the actions across the pages and uses pictures to order the events.
- Uses letter strings.
- Writes name with accuracy or partial accuracy.

Mathematics Development

- Verbally counts to 10 and counts up to five objects accurately.
- Recognizes and names the number of items in a small set instantly.
- Identifies numerals to 10 by name and connects each to counted objects.
- Know the last number states how many in all.
- Follows simple directions related to proximity.
- Identifies a few basic shapes (circle, square, and triangle).
- Makes simple comparisons between two objects.
- Compares and orders a small set of objects as appropriate according to size.
- Know usual sequence of basic daily events and a few ordinal numbers.
- Copies simple repeating patterns.
- Extends and creates simple repeating patterns.
